Readings: Isaiah 55:10-13 & Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

Find a Bible and read the above passages.

A time of reflection

Our readings for this Sunday are linked with the picture language of sowing seeds. The imagery of sowing, growing, reaping and winnowing, runs through the pages of the Bible – which is unsurprising given that Israel, like other ancient societies, lived off its land. Isaiah is talking about agricultural certainties: when it rains, the seed will grow - it is a matter of simple cause and effect. But he is really saying that the word of God is just like that. When God speaks, things happen. Isaiah's message was spoken in the context of salvation, of God's promise to bring his

people back from captivity in exile. So, his point is – if God's word is always powerful, always effective, then we can trust his promises.

Isaiah's message is similar to the one made by Jesus in the parable of the sower in our reading from Matthew's gospel. Here Jesus also uses the agricultural imagery of sowing seeds to make a comparison with hearing God's word. In his parable Jesus compares the word of God to an extravagant sower. When it comes to sowing today, a prudent farmer is careful with the seed, making sure Its only sown where there's enough good soil to give it chance of survival. But peasant farmers in Jesus' day knew that appearances can be deceptive. Where the soil looks sparse there may be in fact deep cracks between the stones where the seed can put down roots. Where it looks deep, it may in reality be only a thin covering over the underlying rock. Seeds would therefore be needed to be scattered far and wide. The sower knew much would not survive - but he would have to trust that enough would survive and grow to provide a harvest.

So, perhaps one way of understanding Jesus' parable is to see that God's word and God's love is for all – good and bad and everyone in between. It speaks of the *extravagance* of our Creator - the generosity and grace of God that encompasses all who have ears to hear and hearts that respond to his word.

Take time to read the gospel passage again. Let Jesus, the Word of God speak to you at this time. Let the seed of God's Spirit take root in your heart.
