A time of reflection

In our reading from the gospel today, some Greeks come to Philip and request that he gets them an interview with Jesus. These Greeks were probably not Jews, but at Jesus' time many people respected the Jewish religion and even came to the city of Jerusalem in Palestine to observe at least, although they could not participate in, this great festival called Passover. Since Jesus is creating quite a big stir among all the people in Jerusalem, these Greeks want to learn more about him. Perhaps even become followers of him, maybe even become believers.

Now it is evident that word of Jesus is spreading beyond the borders of Israel, Jesus says that the time has come for the Son of Man to be glorified.

People from the gentile races are wanting to see him, so now the time has come, Jesus says, for me to be shown for what I am, what I am about.

In order for people to truly see him, to understand the glory of Jesus, they shall have to see it in his dying. There in the cross they will see his glory. He is dying to give many life. He is being lifted up on the cross, so that we can live.

It is there on the cross that we see Jesus' glory. He is all about giving life to us, who without him are dead in trespasses and sins.

On the cross he reveals the true nature of our Heavenly Father. Not a condemning God, but a God who has compassion beyond anything you and I have ever felt. The cross is God's greatest act of compassion towards all mankind.

There was a picture of the crucifixion that I bought in Israel a number of years ago, and it still shakes me when I think about it. Underneath the picture are the words "I asked Jesus – "Lord, how much do You love me?" "This much" He answered, then He stretched out His arms and died"

Jesus does not want to be saved from the cross, the events leading up to Good Friday are not some gigantic cosmic mistake, but the ultimate fulfilment of God's loving purpose.

Jesus draws all people to him on the cross. For it is there we must decide whether we will find ourselves

able to live only by trusting him, or whether we will reject his glory.

We can not see Jesus if we do not see the cross. If we choose to seek him only as a moral teacher, or a worker of miracles.

There are so many images and ways of showing Christ to others: If someone comes to you today and says "We want to see Jesus", what will you show that person?

A King?

A Shepherd?

A Judge?

All of these images have truth contained within them – but the one that reveals most about Jesus, about God, about our human condition? Show them the cross.

Show them our King crucified.

Show them our Saviour killed.

Show them our Lamb of God slain.

Show them an empty tomb.

For there is our good news – that God's own Son came down, was beaten, tortured, nailed onto a rough plank of wood with thorns driven into His head, and died in our place, but death could not hold him and through his death and resurrection the doorway has been opened that we too can have new life - and life in all it's fullness.

The cross of Christ truly is foolishness to the wise. But to those who believe it is the very power and glory of God.
