Prayer of Apporach

In an upper room, You make the extraordinary experience of resurrection an everyday encounter, and in the passage of all living things through birth, growth and death, we notice the possibility of new beginnings. Your words of peace still our hurry. Your story is to be savoured, to fill imaginations, to dream of what is possible. In the peace Your passion for creation is revealed, as Your love heals the division humanity creates between one another. amidst the world around. between heaven and earth.

With Your woundedness we are made whole, and prepared to be the witnesses of Christ's continuing purpose in our time. Amen.

Readings: Psalm 4 and Luke 24: 13-48

A time of reflection

The two disciples in the Emmaus story fail to recognise Jesus on the road. In verse 36, it tells us that 'they thought they were seeing a ghost and were scared half to death'! Jesus calms them by saying: 'Peace be with you' and shows them his hands and his feet – the absolute proof that this was indeed Jesus. How often in our trials and tribulations do we doubt Jesus? We are sometimes blind to see where Jesus is at work in our lives. We experience difficulties in life and sometimes, the darkness overcomes the light, leaving us feeling like we are grasping at the very last straws of our faith, desperately looking for a sign that Jesus is in the midst of the situation.

But if we look around us, can we see Jesus in the everyday? Is Jesus found in the words of another, in the care of the doctor, in the laughter of a child, in the love of a parent? Could this be Jesus?

The disciples had been on a rough road. They had seen their friend tortured, crucified, and cast out. They had been blinded by grief and loss and then against all odds, Jesus returns to them and reveals that all this sorrow is a fulfilling of the Hebrew scriptures. They are comforted by the fact that Jesus shows them something familiar, the breaking of bread, something tangible that they could experience. The fact the disciples had seen the resurrected Jesus transforms them from disciples to witnesses. They are a part of the story of God in human history, laid out in the Hebrew scriptures and they are then called to tell others. It is through this revealing that their faith becomes strengthened, and we can take that fulfilling of the Hebrew scripture through their experience to be truth for us. We might not be able to see Jesus in the physical, human sense that his disciples did, but we can see and experience

Jesus in the reading of scripture and increase our faith knowing that the scriptures have been fulfilled and ultimately find the strength and peace in our lives because of this.

It is a Good News story - Jesus rises from the grave victorious to take away all those wounds which we have experienced by this gift of new life. Whatever trails you are experiencing today, remember that Jesus is walking with you on the road, just like he did with the disciples, and meets with you to take away your fear and doubts through revealing his love for you through scripture, prayer and in the sharing of communion.

The psalm we read today ends with these words of comfort: 'In peace I will lie down and sleep, for you alone, O lord, will keep me safe.' I pray that you might know that peace and reassurance today and that you might continue on the road, trusting, witnessing and strengthening your faith each day.
