Thoughts about ‘church’ & God’s dwelling place

Let’s look at some of the ways the people of God,
the church, have been described by Jesus and in
the New Testament more generally:

Jesus says we are like a field, or an olive tree, or
a grape vine, or a flock of sheep. Jesus calls us
friends and trains us as disciples or learners.
After the resurrection – the gathering of those
following ‘The Way’ became known as:
The Body of Christ: in diversity, all needed and
honoured. The Communion of Saints. Runners in

a race with a great cloud of witnesses. The family or household of God; brothers and sisters together. The Bride of Christ, passionately in love and growing in intimate relationship to Christ. God's living stones built on Christ into a living temple.

We may understand these Biblical pictures of 'the church' as people – not buildings – and yet still live our lives as if church is a place you go to get something you want. Some people treat 'church' as monument or museum. Others as a theatre of light entertainment. For some it seems to be like a fast food restaurant – choose what you want and get out quick! For others it seems to be like a football match – lots of spectators watching a few do the hard work.

So what new metaphors can we find that are more helpful for 2021?

- 1) Citizenship classes for heaven – learning the culture and language of the Kingdom?
- 2) Choir practice for trainee angels - learning harmonies of heaven – resonating with spirit ?

Here are four of my favourites:

1) The Repair Shop

Have you watched it on the BBC? Why is it so addictive – so satisfying – consoling to watch? It is a simple idea – to take items that have got broken/spoiled and get experts to restore them. Things that are too precious to throw away require team work to restore their beauty. There are Teddies with all the stuffing gone, mirrors broken, clocks that don't tick... It is an antidote to our throw-away culture.

Like the Repair Shop - church is a community where people can know they are valued – worth saving. It's where we can meet the one expert, Jesus Christ, who can repair us, restore us...

2) The hospital

There is a quote that says: 'Church should be a hospital for sinners not a hotel for the saints' Pope Francis goes further and says church should be like a field hospital after battle (remember MASH). We need an emergency room not a court room!

3) The gym

'The gym or the yoga studio is the modern-day church'. I like this metaphor – because it's about growth of healthy Christians – not just about running to church when something goes wrong. Footballers, pole-vaulters, cricketers – all prepare themselves in the gym, training off the field so they can perform well on the field. It's hard to be Christ-like in the heat of the moment, if you haven't done the spiritual conditioning.

4) My home - God's home

This is my favourite – Biblical and modern – always relevant. Church as God's home, God's dwelling place. We are God's dwelling place – when we are at home with God. How lovely is your dwelling place – O Lord of hosts.

Intercessions and Lord's Prayer:

We spend some time with God, remembering the needs of the world – and turning our worries and anxieties into prayers. We name before God those people who long for healing – and we voice to God our own needs. We bring our

prayers together in the words of the prayer that Jesus taught us.
